Breeding Count Summary

Total numbers were below average and lower than last year. This is the third breeding count in a row where the total numbers have been below average. The last extended below average stretch was 1997-2001. The period from 2002-2011 saw above average numbers.

Low numbers were seen for many of our more common species, including mountain chickadee, ruby-crowned kinglet, American robin, and vellow-rumped warbler. The low numbers were more pronounced in the montane count areas than the subalpine. Other species with lower than average numbers included green-winged teal (it has become hard to find them in recent times), mourning dove. olive-sided flycatcher, warbling vireo, red-breasted nuthatch, Townsend's solitaire, hermit thrush, Wilson's warbler, Western tanager, and Lincoln's sparrow.

However, the number of species observed was near the all-time high. First time sightings for the Breeding Count were ruddy duck (Ward North group), Western sandpiper (South St. Vrain), and calliope hummingbird (Sugarloaf). Other good finds for the Breeding Count were blue-winged teal (4th time; Arapaho Ranch), Eurasian collareddove (3rd time; Sugarloaf), long-eared owl (2nd time; Ward North), Western kingbird (4th time; the unlikely place of Mt. Audubon), and lazuli bunting (5th time; Ward North). We also note a willow flycatcher seen around Nederland (12th time, but only 4th time since 1998) and a white-winged crossbill seen near Brainard Lake (6th time).

Several species generally seen over 50% of the time that were not observed included common merganser, killdeer, Northern rough-winged swallow, and common grackle.

Species with well-above average numbers included Canada goose, double-crested cormorant, turkey vulture, white-tailed ptarmigan, white-throated swift, rufous hummingbird, and yellow warbler.

Our effort was very good, as we put in over 131 yours, which is above average. We also had 46 observers, which I think is close to a record. So a big Thanks! to all of you for continuing to go out.
