Natural Resource Monitoring

Colorado Butterfly Monitoring Network

Do you get excited when you see a butterfly? Do you care about the health of ecosystems? Then volunteering for the Colorado Butterfly Monitoring Network is the perfect job for you! We are currently seeking energetic volunteers to assist in a new project monitoring Colorado butterfly populations in parks and open spaces throughout the state. Volunteers will observe and record butterflies along a set census route at least six times between May 15 and September 30 2014.

Volunteers are required to attend a full day training on either April 27th (9 am to 3 pm) or May 7th (10 am to 4 pm) at Butterfly Pavilion. After training, volunteers will be expected to identify 25 regionally common butterfly species and understand how to observe them in the field. BCNA to Participate Again with Myrtle Spurge Eradication

BCNA will partner with Wildlands Restoration Volunteers (WRV), Boulder County Parks and Open Space, Boulder County Audubon Society and the Colorado Native Plant Society in multiple eradication efforts of the "List A" noxious weed myrtle spurge (Euphorbia myrsinites). This escaped ornamental is a truly dangerous stranger on many people's property and is designated for statewide eradication by the Colorado Department of Agriculture. BCNA members can assist this effort by participating in one of several volunteer weed pulls to help remove this species on private property where the landowners may not have the resources to do so themselves. TREASURER'S REPORT FOR 2013 Howard Witkin

For the year 2013 we had a net positive cash flow of \$4,798.37. Our income was \$16,382.05 and expenses were \$11,583.68.

The two main contributors of income came from Membership Dues, \$5,503 (33.6%) and Education (BCNA Classes) (\$5,190.50 (31.7%).

On the expense side, Instructor Fees for BCNA Classes, \$3,641.24 (22.2%), Research & Grants, \$3,495.00 (21.3%) and Newsletter Printing, \$1,901.52 (11.6%) made up the majority of our expenses, along with postage.

During the past year we had the financial books reviewed by an accountant and they were found to be in good condition. This was not an audit but a review and correction of any errors that occurred since August 30, 2012. We are continually looking to simplify the financial reports by updating accounts which are no longer relevant to the association. As of December 31, 2013 the Balance Sheet showed the following:

Total cash on hand: \$55,220.36
Restricted Funds: 9,563.72 (*)
Total unrestricted \$45,656.64

(*) Restricted funds are those that can only be used for the following projects:

Allegra Collister Fund (\$6,952.57)

Native Cat Fund (\$1,291.50)

Woods Foundation (\$1,319.65) (**)

(**) After much discussion, the Board ascertained the Woods Foundation fund would be set aside for scholarships for BCNA classes.

A budget has been created to give the board a measurement tool to guide it in making future financial decisions. One of the major upcoming expenditures will be the publication of the new dragonfly book just being completed. Projects like the dragonfly book and possibly paying to have speakers come in from other parts of the country are a major factor in having funds on hand to pay for these activities. When large expenditures are committed for one-time activities the board now has the knowledge of how the expenditures will be repaid, allowing the association to maintain a solid financial footing.

Butterflies Are Survivors! Jan Chu

Explore how butterflies are surviving after the horrendous flood. We'll look at classification and identification of some of the species we are likely to see outdoors, along with life cycles, necessary habitats, host plants, and survival challenges. As a volunteer naturalist for Boulder County Parks and Open Space, she has conducted over 11 years of inventories on butterfly species. Jan has also organized Fourth of July butterfly counts at the Cal-Wood Education Center in Jamestown for 35 years.

Bats Rick Adams

Investigate the natural history of these enigmatic mammals by delving into their ecology, physiology, morphology, and behavior. In addition, we will see bats up-close-and-personal by conducting field work. The class will consist of a "getting-to-know-bats" lecture and discussion followed by a night of mistnetting at a local pond. In addition, we will listen to and record echolocation calls of several species and

watch them drinking by using a night-vision camcorder

with infrared lighting.

BCNA Classes Policies

Refund policy: Participants who cancel at least two weeks before a class will receive a tuition refund minus a \$25 processing fee. No refund is given if a participant cancels less than two weeks before a class begins.

Recommended equipment and reading lists will be provided to participants upon class registration.

Mileage rate for field classes: Non-drivers will be expected to pay drivers 12 cents per mile per person for field class car trips.

Partial Tuition: There will be no discounting of fees if you cannot attend all of the classes scheduled.

Children 16 or under and accompanied by a parent, receive a 50% tuition discount or may apply for a scholarship. Contact individual instructors for the minimum age for each class.

Butterflies are as anxious for spring to arrive as we are. Already two overwintering adult species have been seen. Dan Foscos photographed a Milbert's Tortoiseshell on February 19 and Steve Jones saw one on February 18. A Mourning Cloak was seen by Elvira Glenn on Feb. 19. We expect these species to be among the first species to emerge on a sunny day.

Dan photographed a Checkered White Feb. 19. Sharon Daugherty saw a Cabbage White on February 27. So here's a mystery. The Whites are not likely to survive over the winter as adults. We've had a very cold winter. Did they overwinter in some dry crevice or did they emerge from a chrysalis already?
